Such commitments include demonetising the dissemination of disinformation; guaranteeing transparency of political advertising; enhancing cooperation with fact-checkers; and facilitating researchers' access to data."*

Encouragement to Continue Learning and Staying Media Literate

HOST: These developments are encouraging but as individuals we need to take responsibility for our own online activities and engagement. Media literacy is not a one-time thing, it's an ongoing process. It's important to continue learning, stay informed, and engage in critical thinking. Remember to fact-check information, be critical of the sources, and seek out diverse perspectives.
